

What Were the Crusades?

- Europeans launched the Crusades against the Muslims.
 - In 1096, Muslims captured Jerusalem.
 - Series of wars that lasted almost 200 years
 – occurred during the High Middle Ages.
- Jerusalem: Holiest Places for 3 religions
 - Jews: City where King David ruled and where the great Temple stood.
 - Christians: City where Jesus had lived, preached, and been crucified.
 - Muslims: City where their leader, Muhammad, ascended into heaven.





What Caused the Crusades?

- Jerusalem was full of people from all different religions
 - Lived peacefully
 - Many visitors came to visit the holy land
- Seljuk Turks
 - Group of Muslims that took over in 1071
 - Marched on Constantinople in the Byzantine empireasked Pope Urban II for help
 - Turks stopped allowing Christians to visit Jerusalem
- Pope Urban II (1095 AD)
 - Called for a crusade against the Muslims

He gave this promise to all crusaders: "All who die by the way, whether by land or by sea, or in battle against the Muslims, shall have immediate forgiveness of sins."

Multiple Reasons for Fighting

Regain the Holy Land
Fighting=Forgiveness of sins
Stop Muslim aggression in Byzantine Empire
Chance to travel and make money
Opportunity for nobles to get new land in the Middle East

 Possibility of opening new trade routes between Europe and the Middle East

Who Went on Crusade?

- All types of people
 - Peasants, laborers, knights, kings, and queens.
 - Young and old
 - Poorly trained



Series of Attacks

- There were 4 major Crusades and several smaller ones.
 - The first one was the only success
- The Children's Crusade—Myth or Truth??
 - Took place after the 4th Crusade, which was a disaster for the Christians.
 - May 1212, a 12 year old boy-- Stephen of Cloyes, appeared in the court of King Philip of France.
 - Cloyes delivered a message which he claimed was from Jesus– calling the children of the country to go on a crusade and deliver the holy land.
 - The king brushed him off, but Cloyes traveled through towns and villages persuading children to join his crusade.
 - 2 of their ships sank and many were never heard from again.





What was the Outcome of the Crusades?

- The Crusades are mainly seen as failures.
- The Pope temporarily gained prestige and military authority.
- Made no permanent conquests of the holy land —longest period of control was 90 years
- Increased tension between Muslims and Christians.
- New products from trade—opened Europeans eyes to the rest of the world.
- Increased medical knowledge—Muslim medicine was more advanced.
- Introduced Europeans to soap
- Brought wealth and trade to port cities in Europe.
- Thousands died on both sides
