Types of Government

If you compared all the governments in the world, you would find one thing in common: Someone is in charge. The question is, who?

There are many different forms of government. Some have one leader who has all the control. Others give power to the people.

Background

- Each country has a government but there are many types of governments.
 - Throughout history, most places were autocracies (ruled by a single person) or oligarchies (ruled by a small group of people)
 - Today, many states have some form of democracy in which citizens hold political power

Me, Myself, and I

- An **autocracy** is a government in which one person has all the power. Two types of autocracy:
- 1. Monarchy: a king or queen rules the country
 - Known as a monarch
 - Usually come to power through their family line: king or queen's oldest child becomes the next king or queen
 - Throughout much of history, the monarch held all the power and had the final say in government decisions
 - Modern day monarchs share power with other parts of government
- 2. Dictatorship (Totalitarian): a form of government where one leader has absolute control over citizens' lives
 - If there is a constitution, the dictator has control over that too, so it doesn't mean much
 - Courts and lawmaking bodies may exist but they do not fight for or represent the citizens —rather follow the dictators lead or command





We, Ourselves, and ... US

- Oligarchy: small group holds all the power
 - ="rule by a few"
 - Attain power through wealth, military power, social position, or a combination of these
 - Majority of citizens have little or no power
 - Communism is a form of oligarchy

Power to the People

- In a democracy, citizens hold the political power. There are 2 types of democracy:
- 1. Representative Democracy: citizens elect leaders to represent their rights and interests in government. (Republic)
- Direct Democracy: No representatives. Citizens are directly involved in the day to day work of governing the country.
